


Harry Lorayne R.I.P.



Harry Lorayne (born Harry Ratzer; May 4, 1926 – April 7, 2023) was an American mnemonist, magician, and author who was called "The Yoda of Memory Training" and "The World's Foremost Memory-Training Specialist" by Time magazine. He was well known for his incredible memory demonstrations and appeared on numerous television shows including 24 times on The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson. His book The Memory Book was a New York Times bestseller. His card magic, especially his innovations in card sleights, is widely emulated by amateur and professional magicians.

**Lorayne** saw his first card trick when he was six or seven years old, and immediately knew he had to figure out how to do it himself. He stole empty milk bottles from in front of apartments in the tenement in which he lived so that he could collect the \$.02 deposit on them and be able to afford a deck of cards. He worked at it and figured out eight ways to perform the trick. He practiced sleight of hand at the Hamilton Fish Park in the 1930s. At age 18, he began to perform as a table magician at **Billy Reed's Little Club** at 70 E. 55th St. in New York. The actor **Victor Jory**, noted for his role as a magician detective, was a regular visitor to the club. **Lorayne** started performing memory tricks for Jory and Jory's enthusiastic response changed his approach to performing.

Harry Lorayne grew up poor on New York's Lower East Side and his father, who was a garment cutter, died by suicide when Harry was 12.



This is a first edition Copyright 1962; Edited by Louis Tannen; Illustrated by Edward E. Mishell and Published by Louis Tannen, N.Y.

It is hardbound with 272 good quality glossy pages.

I bought this book in the early to mid 1960's. when I was in my late teens or very early '20s. I was immediately struck with how easy it was to read compared to others at the time. I also loved, and still do, the 'Afterthoughts' he has in his books, this is were he wrote extra tips and thoughts about the trick, without complicating the main instructions.

Close-up Card Magic was the first of many books on card magic that harry wrote, and this volume set the standard for his, and other authors in the clear writing of books for magicians.

Dai Vernon wrote, in part, in the introduction:

"... Onlookers are not aware what decision, what quickness of apprehension, what judgement and even knowledge of character, he (Harry Lorayne) employs when demonstrating some of his card effect. He never fails to completely mystify and bewilder his audience, but more important—he entertains and pleases them. ..."

The book comprises five chapters:

- Chapter I Necessary sleights
- Chapter II—Effective Card Mysteries
- Chapter III—Novel Card Mysteries
- Chapter IV—Unique Card Tricks
- Chapter V—The Turnover Change

There are many great tricks in this book, however the following are amongst my favorites from 'Close-Up Card Magic':

- Little Fella' Big Fella'
- Lorayne's Poker Deal
- Lazy Man's Card Trick

Even though this book was published 60 years ago the writing and quality of content still hold good in 2023.

If you have access to a copy of this book, do yourself a favor and try a couple of tricks from it. I guarantee you will not be disappointed. It is in our library in Box 10R but as it is a 'Null' entry I don't think it is available for loan.

Use it or Lose it

(First published in Magic Makers — April 2023)

They say if we don't use it, we lose it.

Use What? Lose What?

#### According to ChatGPT (2023-03-28)

'The phrase "use it or lose it" is often used to refer to the principle that if you don't exercise a particular skill or ability, you may lose it over time. This can be applied to a wide range of activities, including physical exercise, mental stimulation, language learning, and many others.'

If we don't exercise on a regular basis, we will lose muscle tone, mass and strength. We will also lose muscle memory which develops by the use of certain muscles performing certain actions on a repeated and continual basis. The same applies to our brains.

The contrary also applies, the more we use our muscles the stronger they get, and we can push them to greater strength. The more and harder we use our brain the stronger it gets and it is capable of infinitely more than we can ever imagine.

What about our magic?

Will we lose it if we do not perform?

I can recall coming home from a 6-week overseas holiday, whilst I could still perform, and I found that I was missing some of my cues, omitting minor 'bits of business' and generally, not quite at the top of my game. It took a few days to return to normal.

So yes, the short answer is yes, we will 'lose it' if we don't use it.

Jascha Heifetz is quoted as saying:

"If I don't practice one day, I know it; two days, the critics know it; three days, the public knows it."

#### — Jascha Heifetz

Hang on, I have to practice? Isn't performing practicing?

Well, no, well what about rehearsing? No again.

#### According to ChatGPT (2023-03-28):

"Practice, rehearsal, and performance are all important aspects of any skill or art form, whether it be music, dance, sports, or public speaking.

While it is true that regularly performing gives us an edge, it does not negate the need to practice and rehearse our tricks and routines.

#### According to ChatGPT (2023-03-28)

The frequency with which you practice something new will depend on various factors, such as the nature of the activity, your level of skill and experience, and your goals.

In general, it is recommended to practice something new regularly and consistently to improve your proficiency and make progress towards your goals. It is better to practice for shorter periods more frequently than to practice for a long period infrequently.

We need to practice not only what we have been doing, but any new tricks; bits of business; tricks or bits of business that have been removed; or changes in performance order; etc.

So how often should we practice?

I recall many years ago when asked the question as to how often you practice a new trick before you show it in public, Australian Magician **Barry Govan's** reply was, *"I practice it 4 times a day for a month"*.

It is not enough to just practice, you need to ensure you are not adding in bad habits or errors in technique, it needs to be *perfect practice*, whether or not you practice '4 times a day for 30 days.'

#### According to ChatGPT (2023-03-29)

"Perfect practice" is a term often used in the context of skill development or performance improvement. It refers to the idea that practicing a skill or activity with full concentration and attention to detail can lead to better results than simply going through the motions or practicing haphazardly.

Does it depend on how often we perform as to how often we practice and rehearse our trick; routine; act etc.?

Yes, it does, but this is harder to quantify.

For the past 4 years I have only performed a handful of times, even then it was different styles and routines, so if I want to be at my best I will need to practice and rehearse many times before I am at a level I can consider performing. The previous 10 years I had a little more work, however, I would still have to practice and rehearse at the same frequency as the past 4.

Prior to 2009 I was working full time, every Friday night I had a Restaurant 'table hopping' gig (had the gig for 10 years) and every Saturday night I had another Restaurant 'table hopping' gig (had the gig for 8 years). I also had a constant diary full of Birthday parties as well as corporate gigs. As a result, my practice / rehearsal sessions were much less frequent, but still part of my regimen.

As we have already seen practice involves the deliberate and intentional repetition of a skill or technique with the aim of improving it, whereas rehearsal is important as it allows you to practice your skills in a more realistic and dynamic setting, preparing for the final performance.

The more we perform the less chance we have of 'losing it', however, we still do need to practice and rehearse as well as perform.

If we don't perform, we lose it; If we don't rehearse, we lose it and if we don't practice, we lose it.

Are you using it or are you losing it.

# The Great Harry Lorayne, my Father-in-Law\*

We sat down for dinner at the Jane Street Tavern, around the corner from their home – Harry's concern for his wife was more memorable than anything else that evening. It was my first time meeting my then-boyfriend's father, Harry Lorayne. It was the fall of 2006. And it's a moment I keep coming back to in this time of grieving. That despite Harry's vast career and influence, at the end of the day he was always more concerned with his family. The look of love for his wife – the palpable energy of concern – was so utterly priceless. And over the last 16 years, I've had the immense honor of seeing that same look given to his son, my husband, Robert Lorayne, and to our daughter, Vivi – and to me.

Harry Lorayne, "The Yoda of Memory Training" (Time Magazine), passed away a month shy of his 97th birthday. He would be most annoyed that he hadn't been given the chance to finally say he was 97. He told everyone that "growing old sucks," and that he was not 96, but "in his 97th year of life."

The breadth of influence in both memory training and close-up card magic is astounding. Born on May 4th, 1926, on the Lower East Side of Manhattan, Harry would be the first to share that he was "one of the original dead-end kids," playing on petrified mountains of garbage on Lewis Street and Avenue D which is now the FDR drive in NYC. He was a shy child, who was quite savvy in three areas: the first was improving his memory skills to prevent his father from berating him for poor grades; the second was studying card tricks to break out of his shy shell and make some friends; and the third was picking up freshly discarded cigarette butts to get the last puff. Anyone that knew Harry, knew how tenacious he was, so much so that he went from "telling the time by how many cigarettes he had smoked," to quitting cold turkey due to health concerns. Once Harry set his mind to something, he did it. Full stop. And he did it incredibly well.

He impressed audiences everywhere he went. From the beginnings of performing close-up card magic at The Little Club in Manhattan, to theaters performing the "Memory Act" with his other-half – his supportive and beautiful wife, Renee Lorayne (nee Lefkowitz, 1927-2014) – until they adopted their son Robert in 1968. There were also countless live TV broadcasts around the world promoting his many books, including the NYT best-selling book, The Memory Book. You couldn't be in a room with Harry and not be drawn to his wit, to his passion, to his talents, to his charisma – to his spirit.

Harry's ability to teach while entertaining is nothing shy of genius. His books on memory training and his Memory Power Course have inspired and have helped improve countless people's lives around the world. He was known to reminisce about his 26 appearances on the Tonight Show with Johnny Carson and he was proud to share the story of meeting General Colin Powell – how General Powell put his arm around Harry and said, "Harry, you helped make me a General!"

He shared his passion for close-up card magic generously, taking so many young magicians under his wing. Harry would talk for hours at his desk on Jane Street with any magician who called. He helped write and share other magicians' tricks and effects in his Apocalypse Magazine for over 20 years.

At the end of the day, Harry would give you the shirt off his back if you asked. He was a devoted, loving husband, father, father-in-law, and grandfather, "Papa." The look of awe on his granddaughter, Vivi's, face when he'd show her a card trick – so utterly priceless. His spirit was priceless. I wish I could bottle that spirit up and share it with the world. But I realize in writing this, that he did in fact do that! Every day. He shared his boundless energy, knowledge, expertise, and passion with anyone who asked. Harry Lorayne was not only a gifted man, but he was a gift to the world. I am forever changed by knowing him and he will be immensely missed by Robert, Vivi, and myself.

In going through his desk drawer, I came across a scrap of paper. Written in Harry's script it said:

"Live your life to the fullest - and when you need me, just whisper my name in your heart... I will be there."

You are, Harry. In so many hearts. You are there. Thank you .



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

If you've never seen any of the At the table lectures, I would highly recommend them as they are not only a great bargain (most can be purchased from Vanishing inc. for less than \$10US) you get a full length lecture of anywhere from 1.5-3 hours or longer, loaded with all sorts of tricks, effects and advice, depending, of course, on who is giving the lecture.

Scott wells has a background in magic going back over 40 years and is (at the time of this DVD) a full-time performer, lecturer, artist as well as having contributed to magic magazines and is (or was) a business partner with Banachek.

In this lecture he talks about working in restaurants, gives demos and explanations of various tricks including cards as well as mentalism and also talks about working at trade shows. He gives much valuable advice gained from decades of experience in the field and in my humble opinion, you could do much worse than sitting down one evening and watching this.

### Answers to Roy's 5 question quiz from the March Issue of TMM

Q1 Humming loudly instead of using an orchestra while performing tricks that often failed, who was the man often credited with inventing 'comedy magic'?

#### **Answer: Carl Ballantine**

Born Meyer Kessler in Chicago, Illinois, Carl Ballantine was a magician, comedian and actor. His attempts to be a regular magician in the 1940s were failing until one night when a trick didn't work and he made a joke to cover it up. The audience laughed, so he changed his act to make many of the tricks flop on purpose. He made frequent appearances on television shows in the 1950s and 60s and was the first magician to play in Las Vegas.

# Q2 The ability to make an object disappear is one of the most impressive illusions that can be performed because it seems to contradict the laws of nature. The use of mirrors is especially effective when performing a particular illusion in which a person disappears into a special cabinet that has been wheeled on stage. This cabinet has a name. What is it?

#### **Answer: Proteus Cabinet**

In 1865 John Henry Pepper created an illusion that used the Proteus Cabinet and the clever positioning of mirrors. The trick goes like this: a cabinet with open doors is wheeled onstage and appears to be empty except for a central post. The doors are closed then reopened to reveal a boy who has suddenly appeared, after which he moves on stage towards the audience. After the audience applauds, the boy returns to the cabinet and closes the doors. Once they're opened again the boy has dis appeared. The trick's success involves the use of two mirrors hinged to inside walls. Once the mirrors are pushed flat, the backs of the mirrors match the hinged walls. In order to disappear, the boy pushes the mirrors toward the post, hiding behind them.

#### Q3 What was Houdini's occupation before he quit in 1891 to pursue his career in magic?

#### Answer: Worked in a necktie factory

Harry (as Ehrich was now called) was twelve when he quit school to help support his large family. When his father went to New York City to find work, Harry went with him, and they both took jobs in a necktie factory. In New York City, Harry began practicing magic, and when he was seventeen, he quit his job and formed the magic team Brothers Houdini with his friend, Jack Hayman. (Please note: some sources list his surname as Hyman.)

#### Q4 Siegfried and Roy's full names are?

#### Answer: Siegfried Fishbacher and Roy Uwe Ludwig Horn

Siegfried and Roy's names are quite interesting because they were born and raised in Germany. They first came to the U.S. in the 1960's.

# Q5 Many illusionists use misdirection to trick their audiences. One illusionist, born in 1849, was a master at misdirection. In fact, some believe that he was the inspiration for the character of the wizard in L. Frank Baum's book "The Wonderful Wizard of Oz." Name this illusionist.

#### **Answer: Harry Kellar**

Kellar was so good at what he did he even performed for Queen Victoria. His rope tying stunts were one of many illusions in his bag of tricks. His most famous illusion was to seemingly grow a real rose tree right in front of the audience. Kellar knew how good he was and once remarked about himself: "A brass band playing at full blast could march openly across the stage behind me, followed by a herd of elephants, yet no one will realize that they went by."
