The Dennis Chan Report—June

Competitors are handed a brand new deck of cards with the cellophane wrapper and the seal still intact. The timing starts after the competitor has removed the wrapper and opens the seal. The seal must be opened by hand. The cards must be used as they are from the box and nothing else may be used during the routine. The Jokers and the box may also be used. The cellophane wrapper may also be used. Any additional items will result in disqualification. Last year's winner, Rod Chow was the MC and host for this competition and he also read the rules. This is an adult competition. Robert Teszka was the time keeper. The competitors (in order of appearance) were Charles Gauthier, John Stenning, Roy Hopwood, and Simon Cassegrain. Simon Cassegrain was the winner of the Ray Gamble Trophy for 2023. Congratulations to Simon and to the rest of the competitors.

In between the acts Rod spoke about the first ever President of the Society of American Magicians from outside the USA, the first ever Canadian President of the oldest magic organization in the world in its 120 year history. He also spoke about the benefits of competing at various levels-local, regional, national and international, and encouraged members to enter as competitors inspire confidence, creativity and act development.

Dennis Chan gave another reminder to the members not to play around with their cards and cell phones during a lecture or a competition as this distracts the performer and other members. In the words of Ice McDonald, you should not be performing unless you are scheduled to perform.

The business portion of the meeting, members were reminded about the August picnic, and the September auction.

The evening ended with I.B.M. president Billy Hsueh presenting Dennis Chan with a framed interim certificate recognizing him for the Order of Merlin Excalibur and his fifty years of continuous membership with the I.B.M. The official pin and certificate will arrive by post. Thanks to Billy

and to everyone in the Vancouver Magic Circle.

Graham Kita received a Presidential citation from Billy recognizing him and his hard work and dedication to Ring 92. Congratulations Graham.

Gigs and the Weather

(first published in the August 2023 edition of Magic Makers—edited)

July 2023 has been the hottest month in the world in recorded history. As at July 28, 2023 Phoenix, Arizona have had 26 days straight of temperatures of over 43.3°c. (110°f). With record temperatures in the USA; Italy; Greece and other parts of the world, the indications being that the average global temperature, currently 17.18°c (62.62°f) will continue to increase.

So, if you have a 'hot act' already chances are it is going to get even 'hotter'.

I can recall occasions when a gig has been affected by the weather, not all of which have been heat related.

Not a magic gig, but I can recall on Remembrance Day, Sunday November 11, 1962 as the Troop Leader for my scout group, it was my duty to lay a wreath at the War Memorial. Being in uniform shorts and shirt (No jumper or gloves permitted) it was so cold I could not move my fingers into position to salute.

Again, not a magic gig, but I recall being sent home from work in Stockport, UK as a 16-year-old in the winter of 1962-1963 as a result of the extreme cold, which caused the heating system (steam) to completely freeze up.

'The winter of 1962–1963, known as the Big Freeze of 1963, was one of the coldest winters (defined as the months of December, January and February) on record in the United Kingdom. Temperatures plummeted and lakes and rivers began to freeze over.' ¹

For a couple of years during my 15 years on King Island I worked for a Sand Mining Company at Naracoopa.

Those of you who have visited King Island will now it is situated on the 40th parallel, and it is nearly always windy – hence it is known as the roaring forties. Visitors to the island are surprised just how windy it can get, and often ask, "The wind, is it always like this?" to which the locals will reply with, "No, it is usually much worse than this". This is normally followed up with, "At least you can tell when the wind dies down … the cows fall over".

Being the local magician, the only one, I recall performing at the company Christmas function outside on the grassed open area along the waterfront, I had a table with my props on, but spent most of the show chasing after items from my table which the wind had blown off the table. A hard lesson learnt early on in my 'career'.

We've mention cold, and wind we now move on to the heat.

30 years in Adelaide means you get used, well sort of, to the hot weather. Even the gigs that are indoors can get hot and sticky, making handling cards and the like extremely difficult.

In March 2008, Adelaide, South Australia experienced maximum temperatures of above 35 °C (95 °F) for fifteen consecutive days, seven days more than the previous longest stretch of 35 °C (95 °F) days. The March 2008 heat wave also included eleven consecutive days above 38 °C (100 °F). The heat wave was especially notable because it occurred in March, an autumn month, in which Adelaide averages only 2.3 days above 35 °C (95 °F). 2

This prompted some smart entrepreneurs to produce and sell tee shirts that said:

'I survived summer in Adelaide'

I can recall doing gigs in the heat, not at all pleasant, but nowhere near as bad as doing corporate Santa Gigs in the park, when it was 42°C. You have to stay in full costume and character for up to an hour when you are at the gigs, ending up with your inner clothing wringing wet, and you cannot remove the costume until you are out of sight of <u>all</u> people.

After moving down to Hobart in 2009, partly as a result of Adelaide's blistering heat, I was a sort after Santa. I was also Cadbury's preferred person to 'play' Caramello Koala, alongside his best friend Freddo Frog.







One of the regular gigs was the **Cadbury Marathon** held in **Hobart** each January. Even though **Hobart** doesn't get extreme heat of **Adelaide**, it can still get hot.

The hottest temperature in Hobart, Tasmania history is 41.8 °C which happened on Friday, January 4, 2013.3

Inside the Caramello Koala costume it can become stifling. As the gig is over a few hours, the rule is 20 minutes outside in character followed by 20 minutes back in the change room, where you can remove the costume, then 20 minutes back outside in costume, then

The extremely hot weather is the 'new' normal, so we need to get used to it, as it is only going to get worse, with many more records being broken.

What are YOUR experiences with extreme weather, I'd love to hear about them, that is if you are not too HOT or too COLD.

DARYL'S CARD REVELATIONS VOL 1

Writing this review brings up some very unpleasant memories as well as some good ones, for as some of you may know, the man known as "The magician's magician' died by suicide in 2017. I was quite upset when I found out as I had been a fan for years and learned many things from his DVD's. I still remember talking to him at our 3 of clubs convention where I mentioned this series of DVD's and how much I'd gotten out of it. We'll never know why he made the choice he did, however, his memory and magic will live on forever.

This is the first of a 5 DVD set, teaching the finest methods for revealing selected cards, this first one featuring 23, including classics like the Chicago opener, Happy birthday card, psychological force, the 21 force and many more. Most are very easy to learn and are excellent for the beginner magician or anyone who wants a review.

With simple tricks, one can focus on performance and these effects are excellent for just such a purpose as well as for showing to lay people who will most likely not have a clue as to their methods.

I've always found Daryl to be easy to understand as he explains things simply and clearly and this series is no exception. Easy to watch as well as giving more creative types many ideas and opportunities to modify effects to their own liking, this is viewing that is time well invested.

Roger Sylvestre

Roger Sylvestre, 85 of Vancouver, B.C. passed away on January 27, 2023. He held I.B.M. number 49610R. He was a Vancouver Magic Circle for thirty years.

Best known to everyone he met as a Diamond Driller, Landlord, and Magician. Roger also studied at a Quebec seminary to be a priest. (He did not follow through on this one), was a welterweight boxing champion, sailed in the Canadian Navy, graduated from BCIT, owned drilling equipment and sat on the board of 3 public companies.

He was also a legendary Storyteller. Born in Kirkland Lake, Ontario and raised in Timmins, Ontario but decided in 1962 that Vancouver would his home. He played many sports including hockey, tennis, badminton and boxing. **Roger** was also fascinated by the magicians he encountered in his travels and the shows that he watched.

In 1972 he received a Magic Kit as a Christmas present. There was no holding him back. He frequented every magic store in Vancouver or wherever he travelled. Never could he leave without buying a trick. He called himself an amateur magician. He did shows for Charity and Christmas and Fireworks celebration were never complete unless there was a magic show.

Later on in life he enjoyed sitting on the deck either at home or at the Jericho Tennis club. Spent much time enjoying watching sports on TV and flying The Canuck, the B.C. Lions, or Whitecaps flags on his patio in Kitsilano. He especially loved the Friday nights at Jericho, socializing with his friends and his coffee group at the Kits Eyewear. A celebration of life was held at the Jericho Tennis Club on February 19, 2023.




