New Things

(First published in Magic Makers — January 2021)

We all like 'New' things: new house; new car; new clothes; new magic etc.

Today We all is a new day; 2021 is a new year; Joe Biden is a new President of the USA; we are living in a new 'Normal'.

In these days of Covid-19 the 'new' way to perform magic is by doing 'virtual' shows on Zoom.

I can recall many years ago getting a new Amstrad Computer with a 40MB hard drive, and at a later time getting another 'new' computer with a huge 6GB hard drive. Now I have a 'new' computer with 12GB of memory and around 7TB of hard drive storage.

We are taught that there are no 'new' tricks and only, depending on your source, 7 or 11 different 'tricks', however, I can recall visiting Gerald Taylor at Aladdin's Magic Shop in Melbourne, and asking what 'new' magic he had.

During my lifetime I have seen many changes in the magic scene, from books to VHS/Beta to CDs to DVD's. From computers to the Internet, which has led to Facebook; YouTube; Instagram and many other 'new social media' platforms.

The way we dress as magicians is constantly changing along with the 'new' values of each generation.

I recall watching a corporate training film entitled 'What you are, is where you were when'. It hypothesizes that we grow up with the values of where we were when we were 10. In my case, this is Manchester UK in 1956.

I was always taught that, with only one exception, a magician should be the best dressed person at the function. The exception is weddings, when we should be the second best dressed after the bride.

Doug Henning introduced a new kind of image in his 'hippie' inspired outfits and relaxed conversational approach along with his 'sense of wonder'. These days with the advent of the 'new' magic style of street magic, led by David Blaine, it is a jeans and tee shirt world of magic.

Magicians throughout the ages have also been amongst the first people to utilize the latest technology.

In 1980 American magician Rick Johnsson, published a card trick using a computer. It used a stacked deck and several pages of code written in TRS 80 Basic, e.g.

5 CLEAR 1000

10 A\$= "QUEEN OF HEARTS"

11 B\$= "JACK OF DIAMQNDS"

12 C\$= 'TWO OF DIAMONDS"

19 CLS

This was not a 'new trick' but was a 'new' way to use the 'new' technology.

In 1856 Jean-Eugène Robert-Houdin took advantage of the infancy of the usage of electricity, especially the then 'new' discovery of electromagnetism, to help quell the Marabout uprising, using his wooden light and heavy chest.

These days the new magic uses the power of our smartphones, there are many tricks utilizing smartphones.

One of the early ones was an adaptation by Ian Pidgeon called 'My Pet Boris' of the classic The Web by Jim Pace. Since then, there has been a plethora of smartphone magic apps, not all of them are good. Some are free, others free* and others are paid apps.

Seeing that I am performing my first Zoom magic show in early march, I should get my act together, and adapt my old routines and come to terms with this new media.

This is a new experience for me.

So maybe, just maybe, everything old can be new again.





For the card experts only

One handed Bottom Deal by Barry Govan—Australia



OR THOSE MAGICIANS who have mastered Dai Vernon's one hand "shooting deal" (Inner Secrets, Part 1), a perfect bottom deal can be woven into this deal—but it will require some practice. The grip is the well-known mechanic's grip.

TO DEAL:

Hold the deck tight in the mechanic's grip. The left thumb draws the top card in an arc to the right, about halfway across the deck, the left second finger goes under the deck and engages the bottom card slightly under and to the left of the top right hand index corner and buckles the bottom card inwards. Now, with a movement back, give the left side of the second finger a flick outward and to the left, at the same time bringing back the top card level with the deck. Once you have mastered the flick, the cards can be spun of the bottom at a very rapid tempo.

Incidentally, I found that the bottom cards can be flicked off with more force than the top one hand deal.

It is difficult to describe this sleight but I am sure some of you cardicians will give it a fair trial.

Product Review Packet wallet 2.0 By TOC



This is a step up from those cheap vinyl wallets that usually come with packet tricks; you can easily fit five cards in each side and the clear plastic is curved, making it easy to remove the cards. Some are selling this as a Leather packet wallet, then go on to explain it is PU leather, which, basically, is not leather, but a synthetic, although a very good quality one.

So for about \$5 U.S. it's still a pretty good deal and is much, much, better that those old, ratty vinyl cases as it not only looks better and is easier to use, but it should also last longer and keep your cards in better shape. Vanishing Ink and Penguin magic both sell it.

I thought this would be a good deck to review since St Paddy's day is in March and it has a lot of different shades of green in it. A really colourful deck; released in 2019, it comes with a double backer card, the hearts and diamonds are a light lime green instead of red, and is, of course, of the high quality you would expect of Bicycle cards; the backs look good when fanning and can also be used as a subtle one way deck.

These are out of stock at Vanishing Ink and Penguin magic, however, you can get them on Ebay at various prices and there are other colour schemes available. As usual, you may end up paying quite a bit for shipping from some people and yet others are offering them with free shipping (don't ask me why).



Answers to Roy's 5 question quiz from the February Issue of TMM

Q1 A very common magic word makes fun of Latin words used in the Catholic mass. It was used as the title of a movie starring Bette Midler. It is generally used to indicate that one thing is being transformed into something else, through either sleight-of-hand or alchemy. Which magic word am I referring to?

Answer: Hocus Pocus

"Hoc est corpus meum" is the original Latin chant, meaning, "this is my body." Spoken during the consecration, it is the most sacred moment of the Catholic Mass. It became "hocus pocus" as it moved from holy usage into alchemy and magic.

Q2 P.T. Selbit was an English magician who cut through the conventions of the time and invented one of the first "jaw-dropping" illusions. Which of these tricks was it?

Answer: Sawing a woman in half

Selbit (birth name Percy Thomas Tibbles) was always inventive in his magic act and tried to always have something new for his audiences. The idea of a sawing-a-woman-in-half trick had been discussed for many years but Selbit was the first to present it to an audience, in January, 1921. There were claims that the trick was done earlier but none have ever been proved and illusionists in general credit Selbit with bringing it to fruition.

Q3 Which much missed comedian, also a member of the Magic Circle was known for his red fez and magic that never worked? You'll get this "just like that".

Answer: Tommy Cooper

Cooper was a talented magician, much respected by his peers, but to his adoring public he was always the magician for whom nothing went right, apart from that one moment, during his most ambitious trick when it did. A natural showman, he died on live TV in 1984, midway through his show and his place as a magical buffoon has never been filled.

Q4 A very old trick involves moves like galloping, transportations, vanishes and reappearances. Quite often a few transformations are also thrown in as a climax. What's the name of this trick?

Answer: Cups and Balls.

'Cups and Balls' are a real classic in magic. In fact it is widely regarded as the oldest tricks of all since it has been traced way back to the ancient Egypt.

Q5 You may have seen him on TV as a con-man, a Saturday Night Live guest or a late-night judge but he has always been a magician. Who is he?

Answer: Harry Anderson

A fan of magic since childhood, Harry Anderson practiced magic every day after high school classes in Los Angeles, California. He worked as a street magician for a while, then became an actor, appearing as con man "Harry the Hat" on "Cheers" and as judge Harry Stone on "Night Court". Moving away from television in the 21st century, Anderson has concentrated on performing magic in clubs and restaurants he has owned

Diary Dates*

Ken Brooke

Although his public recognition was not great, **Ken Brooke** had a profound influence on the greats of the UK magic scene, the likes of **David Nix-on, Tommy Cooper, Paul Daniels, David Berglas, Geoffrey Durham,** and **Wayne Dobson.**

British magician and magic dealer does not do him justice. **Ken Brooke** wasn't just another magic dealer. When he sold someone an effect, many times it included his own instructions sheets, which reflected the real experiences of a performer who not only cared about how the tricks should be performed, but who also cared enough to provide information on the proper performance to those who bought his products.

Even for those who do not do particular effects that were sold by **Ken Brooke**, reading these instructions sheets provided real lessons in magic. Invented a version of "**Chase the Ace**" (1955), "**Fido**" (a card trick) and may have invented "**Professor Cheer's Comedy Rope"** (at least he was the first magician on record who performed the trick at Glasgow, Scotland).
