#### The Magic Collector - submitted by Bruce Hunt

At some of the recent VMC meetings I have managed to bring along a few "interesting" pieces of magic equipment that date back to the early or middle part of the last century. At our March meeting I had a set of "Vernon" copper cups (circa 1950's) and a mechanical card table (circa 1932). The card table doesn't really have anything to



do with magic, but is quirky enough to hold the interest of anyone who does card tricks. Over the many years I have actively performed

magic I have managed to pick up new or used magic with the intention of adding it to my show, but never to "collect". I have always thought of the term "magic collector" as someone who would buy old or antique magic equipment on purpose particularly for display, but very rarely used for actual performance. Well, I guess I have inadvertently managed to combine the two and now must admit that I (sigh) do collect.

Most of us who think of ourselves as magicians have an abnormal fascination for gadgets and weird toys. Once out of our teens, we just never grew up and surround ourselves with the evidence. I have managed to convince my wife to stop yelling "Bruce, will you please pick up your toys" to the more refined "Bruce, will you please pick up your magic". I had my sudden realization a couple of years ago when I was cleaning out my magic closet, and took out several items that had been collecting dust. I went on to eBay and other on-line magic auction sites to see if they were worth anything. Unbelievably I was looking at prices that were anywhere from five to ten times what I had originally paid. A lot of that stuff was bought when I was in my late teens and early twenties and didn't have a mortgage and family to drain my bank account. I consider the 70's and 80's the golden age of magic because thanks primarily to Doug Henning, magic went through a major resurgence and top quality props were still somewhat affordable. Back then, old magic tricks were, well, just old, and were not really considered as being a real "antique" with the high sticker price we have come to expect today. There were times (then and now) when I would go on a tangent and buy effects to outfit what I originally thought might be a great idea for an act. More often than not, it didn't work out, and I ended up putting it up on a shelf for use at a later date. Every so often I still take down the item and play around with it a bit (boys and their toys!) and then put it back when I know I won't be using it seriously. I can never bring myself to get rid of any decent looking magic

apparatus, especially if it is old. To clarify, this doesn't make me a collector, this makes me a pack-rat. Have you seen the reality show "Hoarders"? There is definitely some resemblance to me, although my stuff doesn't rot and I can still get through my hallway (well, almost). My advice to anyone wishing to collect - not by accident as in my case - is to pick a particular builder (brand) or item and do your research. For instance, some people collect miniature magic made by Alan Warner, Eddie Taytlelbaum, or even Tenyo. A lot of these tricks already have a high value, but the value will continue to grow over the years. Quality does not go out of fashion! Being that they are smaller items, it is also easier to store or display them. Some magicians collect old tokens or cards specifically made as give-away items for some of the greats (Thurston, Blackstone, etc.). There is a wide range of magic manufacturers that have made similar items that can be fun to collect, for instance multiplying pocket watches, finger choppers, money makers, gaffed coins, magicians tables, reels, hold-outs, rice bowls, or even turn of the century magic books .... all are hot items in the collectables market. I cannot stress more that you read everything you can related to your collecting choice and become as much as an expert on that item as possible so you will know when an item is being offered at sale for too much money (or a bargain!), and what may be incorrectly listed and attributed to a certain maker, when it is in reality not (that happens at lot!). As for any antique or collectable, you also have to watch for knock-offs or damage that will bring the price way down.

One of these days I will bring in a car load of my "stuff" for everyone to take a look at so you know exactly what I am talking about. Now that my old junk is now "antique", I have transformed from pack-rat to collector! Enjoy collecting!!


