


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
Happy 2014 Vancouver Magic Circle! Looking forward to another MAGICAL year...

"How I Got Started in Magic"

Meet Mike Norden (or Norden the Magician)

Rabbi Don Pacht: So, Mike-do you mind if I call you Mike?- How did you first become interested in magic?

Mike Norden: Sure, Mike is fine-I was at Disneyland bored out of my mind on day 4. My wife and I went shopping on our own and I found the magic shop on Main Street. The magician at the counter was doing the hummer card I asked 'How does that work?" He told me I had to buy it to find out. I bought it. He then shows me the Svengali deck. I asked how it worked. He told me I had to buy it. I gave me my credit card and told him that if I asked how it worked he was to show me and charge me. I left with \$300 in magic – mainly trick decks.

RDP: Wow-that's a lot of decks! How old were you at the time?

Mike: 25 years old

RDP: When / how did you decide that 'magic was

for you'?

Mike: After a few months my nieces told their teacher I did magic. So I was asked to come and perform. Since the kids would not be wowed by those trick decks I went and bought some kids magic tricks and I was hooked ever since.

RDP: What is your favorite type of audience and

why?

Mike: Kids. Because I am just a big kid myself.

RDP: What do you love / appreciate most about having Magic in your life?

Mike: Well – I would say that it is a wonderful way to share a laugh, some joy, and amazement- with friends and complete strangers alike. It's a great ice breaker, it's not overly common for people to see or know a magician, so I think it makes you stand out in a crowd. It's a fantastic job – making people smile and getting paid for it. I wouldn't trade it for all the tea in China. (I don't like tea...)



Edolf William "Bill" Eliason February 19th, 1931 - October 10th, 2013


BILL ELIASON

Born in Saskatoon, Sask. the youngest of 5 children, Bill grew up in Vancouver and graduated from King Edward High School. In his early teen years, Bill took up the art of magic, performing as "Eli the magician". This led to other areas and friendships in show business. A natural entertainer and storyteller, Bill went on to excel at producing and promoting a wide variety of shows. He was a member of the Backstage Club, the Vancouver Magic Circle and was inducted into the I.B.M.'s Order of Merlin. In 2005, Ring 92 honoured Bill by naming a new trophy after him. The Tip Top & Tootsie Trophy was named after Bill's magic character 'Tip Top the Tramp' and is awarded annually to encourage the growth in the field of themed magic. Bill was an energetic entrepreneur who built and ran a number of successful businesses over the years, including Attractions

Unlimited, The Gastown Banjo Palace, Canex Products Corporation and Xpressions International Marketing. Known for his dynamic positive manner, Bill was personable and made friends easily. He was a world

traveller making regular trips to the Orient and abroad, but his favourite and most frequent destination was always Hawaii. In Bill's final years, all of us who knew and loved him were robbed of his light hearted sense of humour, infectious laugh and his natural born 'gift for the gab', due to the ravages of Alzheimer's disease. Predeceased by his parents John and Margreta, brother Wilfred, sister Ellen, brother-inlaw Ralph, and partner George Patey. Bill is loved and missed by his remaining family; sister Margaret, brother Bob, brother-in-law Gordy, six nieces and nephews and their children. A Celebration of Life was held at 2:00pm on Friday, November 1, 2013 at the Sylvia Hotel, 1154 Gilford Street at Beach Avenue in downtown Vancouver. Bill's nephew David Wilson officiated at the ceremony and delivered the eulogy. Guy Whitford oversaw playing of the Desiderata and Dave and Trevor Watters presented a Broken Wand Service, the traditional magician's send off. An open mic followed with the telling of some very humorous stories by people who stepped up to 'regale a tale' of their favourite memories of Bill. The afternoon concluded with Family, Friends, and acquaintances raising a glass to the incredible life of Bill Eliason.



Promoting Strong Practice Skills By: Skip Way

Motivating magic students to review and practice between lessons is the biggest problem cited by mentors of young magicians. Here are ten tips to resolve this issue.

1. Create curiosity and excitement.

When students are curious about a subject and then become excited about it, things become much easier. They become more interested in perfecting a move or technique. Promote a curious attitude, and create genuine challenges. Use your imagination, get inside the subject, understand what makes it tick, and explain how each student can apply the principle being taught using real life examples. There are many ways to challenge a student by dis- playing your own curious mindset.

2. Have each student set a practice schedule. Students with a set practice schedule tend to do better. Encourage them to set a specific time for homework, a time for chores, a time for practice, and a time for fun. The practice time slot may become their anticipated reward for completing

less interesting tasks. Setting a time for repetitive tasks builds good habits that will serve them well later in life.

Encourage your students to schedule the unpopular tasks before the fun ones. Relaxing in front of the TV or with a game system before jumping into an unpleasant task is a bad idea. Starting with the fun tasks only makes it harder to start the unpopular ones. Getting started is always the hardest.

Timing also plays a factor. Set study and practice slots at the time of the day when there will be the fewest distractions. Leave post meal times and late evenings, both periods when students will be most tired and least focused, for the fun tasks.

3. Get Started – the Five-Minute Challenge. The hardest part of doing any- thing is getting started. It's like pushing a car up a hill. The effort pulls a lot out of you, but once you top the crest, your down- hill momentum carries you home. So, simply starting each practice session is vital.

Challenge your students to commit to practicing for just five minutes during their daily practice slot. That's it. Commit to giving five serious minutes of practice each day, then stop. Most students will generally fall into the project and work straight through their allotted practice time.

- **4. Stop and start at the fun part**. When a student needs to stop for breaks, meals or other activities, tell them to stop at a fun or easier part of the routine. When they return to their practice later, it'll be much easier to get started because they'll be starting at a fun point. It's like reading a fascinating book and breaking at a chapter cliffhanger. You can't wait to rush back and pick up where you left off.
- **5. Remove distractions from your surroundings.** This is just as vital for practicing as it is for studying. When the TV, phone, computer, magazines, and such are competing for a student's attention, they'll be easily tempted to throw the routine aside. Advise your students to remove as many distractions from their practice space as possible. They don't need to strand themselves on a desert island, but ditching the distractions enhances focus and removes the temptation to do some-thing else.
- **6. Designate a dedicated practice zone.** Once the distractions are stowed away, have your students create a sound practice environment. The ideal environment is a well-lit, quiet room set at a slightly cool temperature with good air ventilation. Have them prepare a clutter-free space for their books, mat, props, and instructions.
- **7. Prepare the mind for absorbing the goal behind practice.** Teach your students how to take five minutes before practicing to refresh their minds and mentally prepare for practice. Turn off any music, sit down, close the eyes, clear the mind and take several deep breaths. Have your students visualize themselves performing the routine before them.


If they're a bit more energetic, try get- ting them to pump themselves up by saying encouraging words like, "I am going to master this move today!"

8. Set reasonable practice goals.

Setting short-range goals enhances motivation. When we have a target to aim at, we are more determined to achieve that step. The sense of satisfaction from these achievements is also a good confidence booster, and this further cultivates sound practice habits

Help your students by breaking complicated routines, such as Cups and Balls, into multiple practice goals. Goal #1: Palming and passing the balls. Goal #2: Handling the cups. Goal #3: Surreptitiously placing balls beneath the cups, and so on. Create your lesson plans with short-range practice goals built into the routine.

- **9. Reward a successful practice session.** Finally, remind your students to reward themselves for a job well done. If they stuck to their schedule, didn't get distracted and successfully achieved their daily practice goals, they deserve a reward.
- It doesn't need to be anything major. Even something as simple as an ice cream sundae, watching a favorite TV show, or calling friends to chat will work. As their mentor, it's often up to you to prepare some form of larger reward for major achievements. Look for creative ways to reward such achievements as perfecting an entire routine, complete with personal flourishes, and presenting that routine before the entire youth or adult club.
- **10. Final thoughts.** Your students have to know that you, their mentor, are genuinely interested in their progress and success. As mentors, we must show as much passion for the art and devotion for sound practice habits as we expect from them. As long as we set the example and show a genuine interest, most of our students will follow through.


