
Richard has over 15 Canadian television appearances. Most recently as the magic co-host on Global Television's "Urban Magic," as well as a feature

Keith Fields Lecture - submitted by David Parker

I had never heard of Keith Fields, so wasn't sure what to expect when I got to Douglas College on June 11th. I saw a very serious looking person at the front of the room, and wondered what the evening would be like. But as soon as the 7:30 lecture started right on time at 7:48, Keith got his street performer personality on and started of by saying what a pleasure it was to work for those who cannot afford to go the Penn & Teller concert. Once I heard that, I knew that my first impression was incorrect as was further shown throughout the evening by this very lively, very entertaining and very funny magician – everything that you would expect from someone who started out making his living as a street performer in Covent Garden in London, England.

As he was from England, he started off with a demonstration of what they call pants and suspenders on the other side of the pond, and what we call pants and suspenders. Then he got into hat juggling, with what was to be the first of many audience participation pieces. These two opening bits were not magic by any means, but very entertaining nonetheless.

His first magic set was his first street act - a cup and ball routine utilizing a chop cup, the vanish of \$20 bill only to have it show up in a salt shaker that was in Gord Boyes' pocket (you'll have to ask Gord about that), and putting a balloon up his nose to clear his sinuses. This was used to explain how to structure an act, as opposed to just doing a series of tricks.

The first half of the lecture was concluded with his Chinese menu prediction, where after a couple of gags, the Chinese food item that was named by a spectator was indeed item 42 on the Chinese menu as Keith had predicted.

Then it was time for the break, but unlike other lecturers, he did not sell anything as he had not shown us all of his stuff, so he would only sell stuff at the end of the lecture – so much for

leaving early.

During the break was the usual presentation of the VMC pen, garment bag, and Maple Leaf cookies, and of course the draw for a member who pre-registered to get their admission back. Interestingly enough, it was the man in charge of the draw, our illustrious President, Bruce Hunt, who won.

The second half started off with two book tests that Keith designed and published himself. The first test was to have 4 spectators each look at a page number as he shuffled the pages in front of him, and he was able to name all four numbers, well he missed one, but had predicted that as well. The second book-test was called Psychic Hangman, where Keith played hangman to determine the word that a spectator had glanced at from a freely selected page in the book.

Then a not magical, but entertaining interlude where he gave 8 or 9 audience members pipes of various lengths for form a human xylophone, and they played tunes for us by hitting the pipes with wooden spoons.

Next up was an ambitious card routine using cads that were blank on both sides, so it was real easy to do – until the spectator signed one of the cards, then we were really impressed, especially with the addition of a paper clip to indicate the signed card.

The lecture ended with a great paddle trick where the spots moved all over the place. Then it was time for the 25 or so of us to buy his lecture notes and other items as a memory of a truly enjoyable evening.

RING OF FIRE BBQ - submitted by Bruce Hunt

At the the end on August I forwarded an invitation to VMC members to attend the annual "Ring of Fire" BBQ graciously offered by our US member Bruce Myers and his lovely wife Jennifer, who also hosted the event. It was held on Labour Day (September 6th) at Bruce's house, nestled on the shore of beautiful Crabapple lake in Stanwood Washington, just outside Marysville – about 35 miles from Seattle. We (Georgina and I) arrived in the driving rain right at the 3pm start time, and were joined by fellow VMC members Ray Roch, Dennis and Melody Hewson, and George Zuk.

After a tour of the house and property (and looking at the mysterious magical "Myers Island"), picking through some of the items set up outside under cover at the magic swap-meet, and schmoozing with the 60 or more guests, the BBQ began – but since the weather was not cooperating, it was held inside the Myers mansion. No hamburgers here! On the menu were ribs, chicken, and a huge assortment of salads and fruit, with a sumptuous desert table set up afterwards that featured a "dip anything in chocolate" theme. After everyone made short work of the buffet, it was show time in the Myers cavernous living room.

I had entered the magic competition and received an email outlining some of the "rules" of the contest. Since this was not a serious competition (have you known either Bruce Myers or myself to be serious?), I did my best to make my show as "interesting" as possible.

The rules were:

- There will be no points for dress or costume. We figure since it's your picnic you should wear what you like.
- 2. Time limits will be from 15 seconds to 8 minutes.

- 3. An award will be given on how much fun you have performing it.
- 4. An award will be given on how much fun my neighbour, Lulu, has watching it.
 ----> There's a catch to Rule #4 which will not be revealed until Labour Day.
- 5. Your act will be judged on mystery, entertainment and originality.
- An award will be given for The Most Red Act.
- 7. An award will be given for The Best Use of A Right Foot.
- ----> Notice that "whose" right foot is not specified.



One other "award" announced later was The Performer With The Most Holes In His Socks.

By the way – the "catch" to rule #4 was that his neighbour Lulu was a dog. Unfortunately due to the weather Lulu couldn't make it, so it was switched to Bruce's dog, Abby.

The first two acts on the bill were adults, Aaron and Dan. They performed to round out the programme and were not entered in the competition. I knew I was in trouble when I found out my fellow competitors were members of the "Ring of Smoke" - three Junior members, and I was the only adult actually entered. None of them were over 12 years old! The first contestant was Matt, followed by Logan, then myself, and finally Diego. As a treat to finish things off, Ray Roch performed. What can I say?

The three boys performed great, but I managed to bring home to Canada three prestigious awards . I won the - Impressing The Dog award (I cheated by offering Abby a doggy treat), The Most Red award (I produced and old Russian flag while proclaiming "if this ain't red, I don't know what is!"), and the coveted Best Use of A Right Foot award (a fake right foot I claimed to find on the shore of the lake and produced a line of flags from it which was a "real magical feat/feet"). I did not however win the award for the magician with the most holes in his socks even though I wore a black net stocking on my right leg. That award went to Logan who really did have more than six real holes in his sock! The rest of my act consisted of a story about coming through the border while producing several large illegal items from a small container, finishing with an prediction billfold effect.

Around about 8:30pm we decided to head on home (Ray Roch wanted to go first because he said if I got stopped at the border with some of the items I had brought, the border would be closed down for several hours), but when I got to Mount Vernon – about ½ and hour away from Bruce's place, I discovered that I had dropped my wallet in the mansion and we had to go back to retrieve it. All in all it was a great day (albeit a little longer than I had anticipated!) and our thanks go out to Bruce and Jennifer Myers for putting on a great shindig and being wonderful hosts, and to the members of the Ring of Fire (and Ring of Smoke), for putting up with their Canadian counterparts!



Tom Noddy Lecture - submitted by Dennis Chan

The Tom Noddy lecture is difficult to describe as it was all visual. Tom described the scientific principles of making soap bubbles. One of his effects was a "caterpillar", whereby there was a series of bubbles joined to each other, starting with a large bubble followed by several smaller bubbles.

Tom told lots of stories between his demonstration, relating to famous magicians he had met. He bounced bubbles off of his knee and elbow, made a large clear bubble, and by using a "fog" machine, made a small bubble inside of the larger one which looked like a ping pong ball floating around.

There was the "Mount St. Helen's" bubble that looked like it was erupting - again using the fog machine creating the illusion of the eruption by slowly releasing the "smoke" as the bubble shrank. Next was an explanation of the techniques used to dip the bubble wand into his special soap mixture to make the bubbles correctly.

Alex Seaman took part in the programme by blowing onto a large bubble which caused several small bubbles to appear inside of the larger one. Billy Hseuh also had a personal lesson from Tom on how to blow bubbles. One impressive feat was the building of a carousel from various sized bubbles, with the final product spinning around like the real thing. Other

bubble stunts included the ability to puncture a bubble with a straw without bursting it (like needle through balloon), and a rectangular bubble, again using the fog machine to highlight the odd shaped bubble trapped inside a clear one. After a brief break to present Tom with the usual VMC gifts (pen, cookies and garment bag), and of course the inevitable product sales, everyone came to the front for a little hands-on bubble workshop. Mike Norden won the draw (\$20 admission refund) and in attendance were 26 members, 5 spouses, and 8 juniors. A good time was had by all at a very interesting and different type of lecture!

Another member of the Carlson family, Brian Carlson, who is Dave's Father, sold 50/50 draw tickets and did a great job. David Wilson was our man at the back of the hall taking money and giving out money at orderly fashion.
